



- Digital camera

Shape display

- Print the children's photographs and lay them out for sorting.
- 🔭 Use labels or large pictures to represent the shapes your class have looked for. Ask children to match : their photographs to the label. They should stick these on with glue.

During a walk through the school, encourage young children to look for shapes they can recognise in their school

certain objects are particular shapes. It is worth pointing out that some 2D shapes they notice may be part of a 3D

building and in the objects they use every day. Let them photograph shapes they recognise. Ask children why

object; e.g. a 3D desk has many rectangular faces. It is the flat 2D shapes they are looking for in this project.

- Mount these onto a backed display board.
- Make the display interactive by sticking on additional photos with hook and loop fasteners, with a written invitation to place them correctly (it may be best to laminate these as they will wear out as the children reposition them).
- Leave extra hook and loop fasteners attached to the board for repositioning.
