


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# Crafty Ideas: Sizing Up Leaves

Playing with our sense of scale can make us look at very ordinary objects like leaves, in a fresh way, appreciating the detail and intricacies of their patterns. This activity involves children making giant leaves decorated with patterns they've observed through the microscope.

### You will need:

- · An overhead projector
- Microscopes
- A collection of leaves
- · Large sheets of paper
- Drawing pencils
- · Fine-line black pens

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#### Use

Use as part of themed work you are doing on trees and leaves, or to develop children's observation and drawing skills.

## Make

- Pin a large piece of paper to a wall facing the overhead projector.
- Place the chosen leaf on the projector.
- Draw around the large image of the leaf that is projected onto the paper. Remove the paper from the wall and cut out the outline of the leaf.
- Now place the leaf under a microscope and observe the pattern.
- Try to draw the pattern on the surface of the sized-up leaf in file-line pen. As the surface is large you could ask several children to work together to cover each leaf shape in pattern.
- You could also give each child a leaf to observe and then draw on a small piece of paper. Direct them to mimic the patterns of the veins with a fine-line black pen or charcoal.

## Display

Mount the giant leaves on black paper to heighten the contrasts in the pattern. Surround them with mounted versions of the smaller individual images. You may also want to include a poem such as, *Falling Leaves* by Stanley Cook in the display

Falling Leaves

The leaves in Autumn

Swing on the boughs

Pushed by the wind, Backwards and forwards

Far above the ground.

The wind blows hard

And the leaves let go Their hold,

Flying over the wood

Like a flock of birds

And brown as sparrows

Flying above the house. The wind lets them fall
